In todays world of downsizings and rapid reorganizations, organizational behavior is conditioned less by dramatic leadership than by the information environment that surrounds groups and creates social values. That environment is the information ecosystem that controls data and human behavior. The Ecology of Information explains why information means more than statistics and raw data. It behaves, instead, like living tissue inside of information organisms. The public sees these organisms as formal organizations controlled by people. But underneath the veneer of human control, information biology governs collective behavior and actions. Interacting with each other, all information organisms make up the information ecosystem that we know as culture. The ecosystem balances information biology to keep all information organisms alive and productive. Anyone who wants to understand how organizations work needs to understand the rules of the information ecosystem and its resident species. The book explains those rules and shows why organizations sometimes behave with complete disregard for individual needs and desires.
