In order to give the second crop an even start on all the plots they were mowed June 16, and the clippings were raked off without weighing. The flood prevented cutting the second crop and a large proportion of plants died before August, the killing being very uneven and independent of the fertilization. Q Timothy, red clover, and redtop. --Hay from these plots was cut on August 7, the timothy being ripe at the time. There was a fair stand of clover on all, but the plants were small and redtop formed only a small part of the crop. The yields reported in Table XXXI show the marked effect of phosphate whether supplied as acid phosphate or in manure....
