




Scandals and Follies: The Rise and Fall of the Great Broadway Revue

They evolved from the rich turn-of-the-century tradition of burlesque, minstrel shows & spectacles, & they combined slapstick & satire with abundant chorus girls, music & opulence to reflect & comment upon the ever-changing styles & values of their times. & whether George White's Scandals or Ziegfeld Follies, whether Little Shows or Passing Shows, they introduced to the world such immortals as Irving Berlin, Jerome Kern, George Gershwin, Al Jolson, Will Rogers, Jack Benny, Fred Allen, Sophie Tucker, Helen Morgan, Fanny Brice, Fred Astaire, Ethel Waters, Bert Lahr & Bob Hopeto name but a few. What would the last century have been like without them? All of the legendary talents, as well as the fabulous, often outrageous impresarios who brought them to Broadway, are revisited in Lee Davis's bountifully illustrated, superbly researched trip through time.
