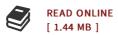

I raised the plants during the first genera tion of seeds from known parentage, the owers from which they came having been carefully pollinated by hand. In some instances the second generations were grown from hand-crossed seeds, but in other cases the second generations were grown from seeds simply selected from the first year patches. As the experiments have been made in the field and upon a somewhat extensive scale, it was not possible to measure accurately the plants and the fruits from individuals in all cases; but the results have been so marked as to admit of no doubt as to their character. In r889, several hand-crosses were made among egg-plants. Three fruits matured, and the seeds from them were sown in 1890. Some 200 plants were grown, and they were characterized throughout the season by...
